Deposits and Cancellation Policy

A deposit of \$895 per room is due 45 days before each tour. This enables us to make prior arrangements with food, hosts, ground transport, etc.

Cancellations are permitted up to 25 days prior to departure, but incur a 50 percent termination fee unless funds are transferred to another 2011 tour date. No refunds are possible inside of the 25-day limit.

The balance of your tour charges will go toward your accommodation costs, and should be brought with you to Kentucky. This will amount to approximately \$420 for single occupancy, and \$210 for double occupancy. You will handle your check-in and check-out directly.

Take the "Nickel Tour" of Manchester

Get the lay of the land from local bard and native son, John Thomas Becknell.



Touch the Salty History

Learn about early Indian influences, the discovery of salt, and the County's infamous feuds. Get a special briefing from local historian Charles House at the restored Langford Saltworks.



Investigate Kingdom Businesses

Shop and eat in local Christian-owned establishments like Rebecca Leigh Accents, Huddle House, and the Starwood Mountain Dining Company.



Encounter Genuine Mountain Men

Let one of Kentucky's leading marksmen show you how to shoot a flintlock rifle, or let premiere trapper Ralph Hollin fill you in on the local wildlife.



Meet with Godly Officials

Spend time in prayer with some of Clay County's top administrators, judges, and law enforcement personnel (An added bonus will be interactive time with senior leaders from the federally-sponsored Operation UNITE).



Hear Riveting Tales of Deliverance

Marvel at the testimonies of drug dealers, addicts and former moonshiners whose lives have been transformed. This will be a highlight of your trip!



Learn About the March Seen Round the World

Walk the route where, in 2004, nearly 4,000 Christians from 63 churches took a stand against drugs and corruption. Listen to local pastors explain how Manchester, Kentucky was transformed into the City of Hope.



Experience a Bluegrass Country Cookout

Chow down on some great chicken or fish while the Mountain Cabin Boys light up their banjo, mandolin, and washboard. Awesome!



Regional Excursions

CENTRAL APPALACHIA is Daniel Boone country, and the sense of history literally hangs in the air. From the historic Cumberland Gap where early pioneers poured into the Kentucky wilderness, to Fort Boonesborough where Daniel Boone and 40 colleagues fought off an attack by hundreds of British, French and Indian fighters, stories of Divine Providence abound.

Visitors to Eastern Kentucky will also encounter a mountain coal culture. For decades, men from many lands have toiled deep in the earth to provide fuel for the nation and a living for their families. Much of this culture has been preserved in museums and exhibition mines scattered across the wrinkled landscape.

Each FIRE Tour will incorporate at least one or two excursions into the surrounding countryside and culture. Featured here are some of our target destinations for 2011...



Fort Boonesborough
See where God intervened to preserve the lives of Daniel Boone and early settlers in the siege of 1778. At the nearby "living history" museum, you'll also have an opportunity to observe authentic pioneer life.



Berea Artisans Village
Watch craftsmen at work in Old Towne Berea. It all started in the late 1800s when students at Berea College were allowed to work for their tuition. Now known as the Folk Arts & Crafts Capital of Kentucky, it is a great place to pick up a souvenir!



Kingdom Come State Park
At an elevation of 2,700 feet, the wonderfully-named Kingdom Come State Park offers exquisite vistas. Hear a local natural resources expert from the University of Kentucky talk about how God has recently brought the land back to life.



Portal 31 Exhibition Mine
Once the largest mine in America, Portal 31 now offers fascinating underground rail tours. We'll also visit the Kentucky Coal Mining Museum in nearby Benham, and spend the night in the delightfully reconvered Schoolhouse Inn.

Cumberland Gap

Look into four states from Pinnacle Overlook, and meander down paths trod by the first pioneers to enter the American wilderness. On the way home, stop at the picturesque Cumberland Falls, or the world's first Kentucky Fried Chicken café.



Wilderness Road State Park

This 200-acre park is home to the Wilderness Road trail carved out by Daniel Boone in 1775, and offers both an outdoor interpretive center and an excellent film entitled, "Wilderness Road: Spirit of a Nation."
